

# COVENANT OF COMPANIES FOR CLIMATE AND ENERGY

## No net zero without SMEs

## What was the Covenant of Companies?

- Pilot initiative led by the European Commission (DG Energy) to **encourage and support companies** to step up their contribution to a **clean energy transition** and increase private **investments** in clean energy **Research & Innovation** (R&I), technologies and solutions.
- Pledging scheme encouraging businesses, in particular SMEs, to commit to take action to reduce their carbon emissions. Companies could choose from different levels of commitment which reflected where they were on their journey to decarbonisation.
- Whatever the commitment, companies received practical, step-by-step guidance and/or technical assistance to help them take concrete actions resulting in the decarbonisation of their businesses.
- Recognition of the steps taken by companies with a 'Seal of Approval' scheme.
- Duration: January 2022 December 2023





### Why was it important?

- 24 million small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in the EU make up 99,8% of all EU businesses.
- SMEs contribute to 64% of industrial pollution in Europe.
- 40-45% of SMEs are considered to have a large environmental impact;
- By supporting and recognising the efforts of companies no matter how big or small – to induce bottom-up change, the Covenant of Companies was expected to help reaching the 55% emissions reduction targets by 2030.





### How was it expected to achieve this?

#### PLEDGING AND RECOGNITION

- The initiative offered a pledging scheme with several levels of recognition (entry, bronze, silver and gold).
- The entry level of commitment looked at finding ways to trigger a company's awareness and understanding of which actions are crucial for business and planetary survival.
- Bronze, silver and gold encouraged and supported companies to take one or more concrete measures to reduce their GHG emissions.

#### **ADVISORY SERVICES/TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE**

- Provision of practical advisory services to European companies to help them decarbonise.
- Two calls for technical assistance for companies: June 2022, May 2023.
- Guidance documents and other useful <u>resources</u> are still available online, and while the project was still running, also peer-to-peer learning and masterclasses.
- The project encouraged business investment in clean energy solutions/technologies to help mitigate climate change while also improving business performance.






## The CCCE pyramid approach



## Who could pledge and apply for assistance?

- The Pledging was open to companies in all 27 EU Member States (and groups of companies)
- Technical Assistance could be delivered in Bulgarian, Dutch, English, French,
   German, Lithuanian, Romanian and Spanish.

#### And now?

- There's an evident **overlap between cities and towns** representing 75% of the EU's population and the **huge number of SMEs**, most of which do have 5 or less employees and most of which **operate locally**.
- **SMEs can therefore be local agents of change**, especially in small and mid-sized cities and towns (**70%** of the urban population), most of which suffer from a lack of capacity (budget, human resources, know-how, ...) and struggle to benefit from EU-level funding and financial tools.
- The idea of integrating the CCCE under the EU Covenant of Mayors for Climate and Energy (EU CoM) did not fly, but the Covenant runs a dedicated action on involving local companies in fulfilling the signatories' commitments.
- The **Smart Cities Marketplace**, collaborating very closely with the CoM, has recently established a **dedicated web page for solution providers**, so that companies offering specific services or products, can be recognised and contacted by interested municipalities.
